THE RECTOR'S WHATNOT: Report for the 2011 Annual Meeting The Rev. Fr. Kelly Marshall

Friends at St. James' Church,

I was a bit surprised when I began preparing this report for our upcoming Annual Meeting. I realized that it's the eighth Rector's Report I've shared with you. *Where have the years gone?* And that made me reflect on where we were back in January 2004 and where we are today. But before I share some of those reflections with you, let me say a word about this past year.

I appreciate greatly the prayers, kindness and support you gave me during the eleven months prior to my father's death last May. Those months for me entailed more than the usual number of trips to his home in Pennsylvania. Our Vestry, Ministry Coordinators and Clergy gave me the time I needed to care for him and my mother in his last months—and then to begin the process of making sure my mother is safe and well and happy, now that she is alone. Thank you.

This same past year has been one of your **investment in the future of our parish family's mission**. You stepped out in faith to provide one-third of a halftime salary for the Rev. Zeke Coughlin, and the Bishop's Office has provided the additional two-thirds. Zeke's presence is a gift to the life of our congregation, and we in turn give him the gift of a loving and supportive family of faith as he begins his ordained ministry in the Episcopal Church. I am delighted to have him and Lisa with us here at St. James' Church.



Zeke is only a part of our abundance of clergy. The happy and supportive ministry of Father John Wigle continues, as does the leadership his wife Barbara provides for our children's Christian Formation ministry. And we are doubly blessed with the addition of the Rev. Mary Vidmar to our staff—a second "Associate Priest Retired." Mary has made her home at Lake Milton in this first year of her retirement from parish ministry, and she has chosen to drive all the way

to St. James' Church to be part of our congregation and, now, of our clergy team.

What does this mean? Well, for me the most important meaning of our abundance of clergy is that you, the parish family, have the advantage of broad experience in service to God through the Church, varied gifts for ministry, and differing voices and perspectives as we proclaim the Gospel through teaching

and preaching. And for me personally, it means that I have the gift of colleagues working with me, and in a parish our size, this is quite a unique gift. *But there is a word of caution:* each of us needs faithfully to fulfill our own ministries, so that when the day comes that it's once again only you and I, we're not then neglecting any of the vital work God has entrusted us.

The second significant investment you as a parish family made in 2010 is the generous support you've offered to underwrite the new year's budget. A personal word of thanks from me, as your Rector, to each of you. And an intentional word of gratitude to Ralph Sylvester, who with the Vestry provided the leadership to interpret our needs in such a way that many responded—**an investment in the future of the mission of St. James' Church.**

Let me return for a moment to my initial reflection on *where the years have gone*. Herb Olmi and I were talking last Sunday morning about how St. James' Church is not the same parish family it was seven years ago. That would be true of any parish after any seven-year period, I guess. But we successfully if sadly navigated out of our shared ministry relationship with St. Augustine's Church, which was in place when I came here. And our parish family has been enriched by the advent of members of the former St. Rocco's and St. Andrew's parishes, as well as new members who have found here a spiritual home. That conversation with Herb and my preparing this report helped me think about aspects of my own ministry here, and how I believe I've contributed to building the parish we are today.

From the perspective of a basic theology of ministry, I've tried to establish and encourage a collegial, collaborative relationship with the Vestry and among those who take leadership in various areas. I do not believe in a "father knows best" style of par-

ish leadership, and neither do I want to encourage in any way the state of conflict between Rector and Vestry which is a way of life in some parishes. Collaborative leadership is circular, not top-down leadership. We are a parish family made up of people from many differing denominational backgrounds. We all have experienced both positive and negative clergy-lay relationships. I hope that a gift I've given to you is an effort to reinforce the Church's teaching that "the ministers of the Church are the lay people, the bishops, the priests and the deacons." We are in this together as friends; our ministries can be complementary, not competitive.

I'm glad over the years to have encouraged and helped make these aspects of our *present* parish life a reality:

- ✓ regular variation in our Sunday liturgies and our music, drawing on the multiple approved services of the Episcopal Church and more contemporary music, to help make our weekly worship more beautiful, meaningful, relevant and communal;



- ✓ a monthly Sunday healing liturgy;
- ✓ an annual Rogation Sunday Blessing of Animals;
- ✓ the faithful keeping of the Church's Principal Feasts (see Prayer Book, pg. 15);
- ✓ a joyous and loud celebration of the Great Vigil of Easter;
- ✓ our annual St. Nicholas' Festival and Parish Advent Party;
- ✓ the festival keeping of St. Mary Magdalene's Day, St. Rocco's

Day, and St. Andrew's Day;

- ✓ establishing ministry teams, with a regular meeting of Ministry Coordinators for evaluation and visioning;
- ✓ more active parish representation in the life of our Diocese;
- ✓ fellowship opportunities, such as our Singles & Couples ministry and the Men's Breakfast;
- ✓ encouraging and supporting committed lay leadership for our ministries with children and youth;
- ✓ periodic Super Saturdays for our younger children, to help them learn Bible stories;



- ✓ establishing with the help of many the St. Rocco's Shrine in our entryway, and encouraging the placement of the *Christus Rex* and Stations of the Cross from St. Rocco's Church;
- ✓ promoting a fitting celebration of our bicentennial between 2007 and 2009;
- ✓ establishing with the cooperation of the Beard Family the St. James' Bicentennial Alcove;
- ✓ lobbying for the placement of two new stained glass windows;
- ✓ sharing pastoral ministry with lay members of the parish family;
- ✓ facilitating the ministry of (first) seminarian and (now) Deacon Zeke Coughlin in making our parish his parish family and the site of his first ordained ministry;
- ✓ encouraging and supporting regular, creative and varied approaches to adult Christian formation;

- ✓ encouraging and promoting a new and consistent theology of Christian year-round stewardship, based on abundance rather than scarcity;
- ✓ doing my part to explore and identify sources of conflict among our leadership, and prayerfully walking with the lay leadership toward a new sense of servant, collaborative ministry together;
- ✓ welcoming and sharing my ministry with our Associate Priests Retired;
- ✓ setting the Baptismal Covenant as a standard for parish life and individual discipleship.

I might name *that many more* challenges and happy prospects for the next several years—but that task can await another setting. Your Vestry, Ministry Coordinators and Clergy will be meeting on February 5 for our first 2011 Leadership Day. We'll be thinking together about our ministry in 2011 and 2012. ***They and I will prepare a report for you and have it in your hands in early Lent.***

The year 2011 brings my sabbatical, which I postponed last year because of my parents' needs. I'll be away from late May to early September. As May approaches, your Vestry and I will be sharing with you the purpose of a clergy sabbatical, where I'll be and how I'll be spending this *sabbath time*, and how my ministry tasks and responsibilities will be covered during my absence.

Once again, let me say what a privilege it is to be sharing the ministry of our historic parish with you. *I'm still glad to be here.* You are in my regular prayers, and I look forward to the work God has given us to do together, in the coming years.

A stool must have at least three legs to stand. A stool with one or two legs would constantly be falling over. This is the image that has come to be used to describe the pillars of the Anglican Church: scripture, tradition, and reason. The famous Anglican theologian, Richard Hooker, described these three things as necessary for a stable life of faith. *Scripture*, of course, refers to the reading of the Bible. This leg keeps us grounded in the only reliable written histories we have of God's actions with humanity. *Tradition* refers to the long history of teachings and ceremony within our Church: the teachings and rites handed down from the original twelve disciples, and the writings of the many saints, contemplatives, theologians, evangelists, and liturgists that have come along since them. Our tradition is a foundation for how we interpret God's actions. We may do new things, but we are always building on our tradition, not starting from scratch. *Reason* is the use of our own God-given intelligence (with the guidance of the Holy Spirit) to interpret Scripture and Tradition. Through reason we ask hard questions, view our religion in light of our own thoughts and experiences and truly make our faith our own. Without any one of these three things, the stool of our life of faith would be skewed and possibly fall over.

Recent theologians have made the claim that a tricycle is a better metaphor than a stool. *Scripture* is the big wheel in the front. It's the wheel that steers us to where we need to go. It's the wheel that has the pedals attached to it, because scripture is what allows us to move forward in our faith and in our understanding of God. The two wheels on the back of the tricycle are *Reason* and *Tradition*. These wheels are not the central focus of our faith, but without them to balance the front wheel, the whole bike would tip. *Reason* and *Tradition* are essential to our interpretation of *Scripture*, and keep us from slipping into extremes that would devalue the text or take it too literally. However, the best part of this metaphor is that it requires motion. A stool is something we sit on. It's static. But a tricycle is something we ride. It takes us places, just like a life of faith. And like a life of faith, it requires us to pedal!

Our parish family has suffered a great loss with the death of our friend Patti Opsitnik on January 9. Patti was a vital member of St. James' Church, serving on the Vestry, Pastoral Ministry Team, Outreach Team, and ECW. She also assisted with our annual Animal Blessing event and contributed her time and talents to helping with our parish newsletter. "Pet Tales," a feature column dedicated to our beloved pets, was her idea. And she gave careful attention to proofing the newsletter before it was published.

Patti loved music. She spent countless hours helping our choirmaster Frank Lynn organize and catalog anthems and repair tattered pieces of music. She was also a great help to me, a nonreader of music. Sitting next to me in the alto row, she would patiently explain the musical notations which were foreign to me. Many folks probably didn't realize the seriousness of the health issues she was battling because she did so with an optimistic outlook and fierce determination to get better. I often told her what a great inspiration she was to me for the way she approached each new day. She told me that she learned it from her daddy, Howard O'Dea. Amid all that she was dealing with, she would often inquire about what was going on in my life and at church. I quickly learned that there wasn't anything you couldn't talk about with Patti. She was very wise, well read, and had a wonderful sense of humor. She listened as I regaled her with whatever new card making technique I had discovered that week. She loved cards and enjoyed sending birthday and get well wishes, not only as a member of the Pastoral Ministry Team, but as a loving member of our parish family.

We celebrated her life and ministry on January 12 with a Requiem Eucharist, using music and readings that she carefully selected. I'm so very thankful to God that I was blessed to call her my good friend.

Patti's memory will live on in the hearts of her family and her many friends at St. James' Church. ☞

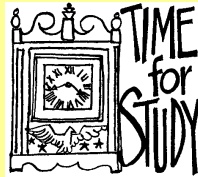


FEBRUARY ADULT FORMATION OPPORTUNITIES

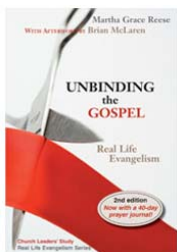
